

Novelist and poet Silko has granted few interviews since her first novel, *Ceremony* (1977), was published and has even remarked that "novelists should write more and talk less." Yet, she's a fluent and thoughtful interviewee, answering questions in depth with equal measures of seriousness and humor in the 16 hard-to-find interviews gathered here. Editor Arnold provides a concise introduction, noting that Silko, of Native American, Mexican, and white ancestry, grew up in Laguna Pueblo, New Mexico, where she developed a love for traditional Native American storytelling and a devotion to reading and writing. Silko also developed a commitment to helping achieve justice for Native Americans and initially studied law until she realized that for her, literature was a far more versatile tool. Conversant in history, psychology, spirituality, and literature, Silko talks generously about her life and work, reflecting on her interest in the interfacing of Native American and Western cultures; the psychic demands and unexpected discoveries associated with writing *Almanac of the Dead* (1991) and *Gardens in the* Dunes (1999); and her belief that the "human spirit wants no boundaries." *Donna Seaman*
